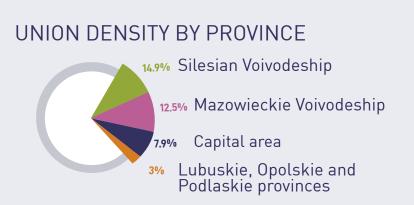

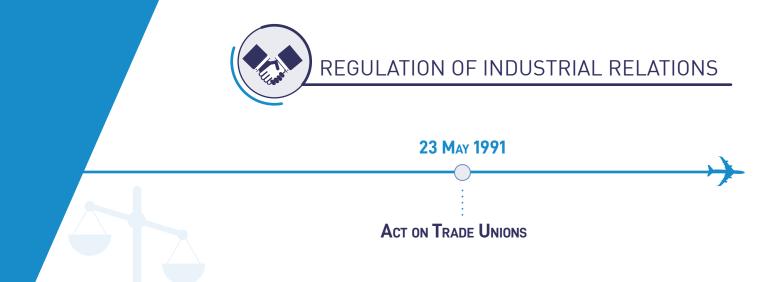


WORKPLACE REPRESENTATION

Only present in 1.7% of enterprises





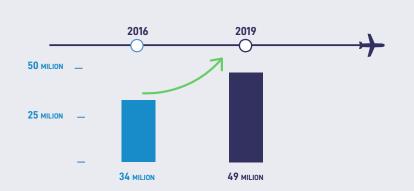

STATE SUBSIDIES

Sector is highly dependent on direct state subsidies

Total infrastructure investments by Polish Air Navigation Services Agency between 2015-2019: €200 MILLION

Flagship carrier, LOT Polish Airline, received **€215** from 2004 to 2020 in state aid, including a bail-out

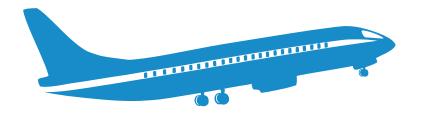

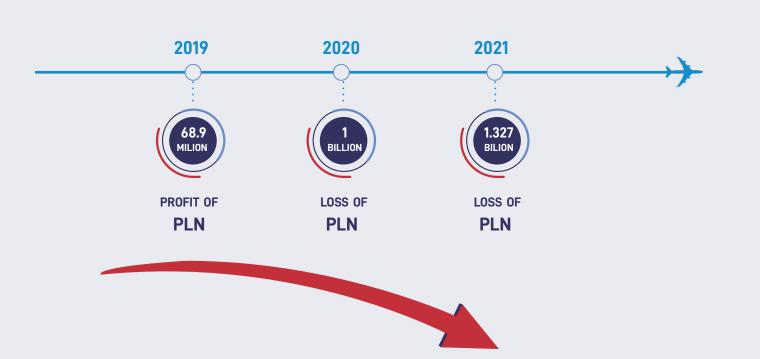




Impact of COVID-19

POLISH RESPONSE

First quarter of 2022 70% of activity with respect to first quarter 2020



No direct aid to the industry

KEY LEGISLATION

CRISIS SHIELD 4.013

ARTICLE 15GE SEC. 3



stipulated (Article 15ge sec. 3) that the provisions of collective agreements or wage regulations were suspended during the period of an epidemic emergency in the event of a decrease in the employer's economic turnover

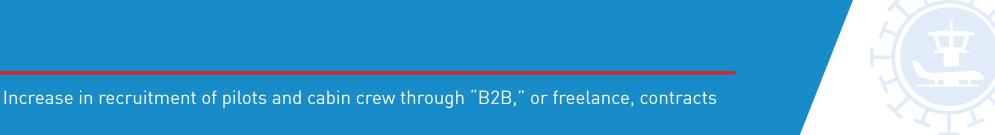

Temporary CBA to govern return to work of laid-off employees signed with unions, in effect UNTIL 2024



POLISH AIR NAVIGATION SERVICES AGENCY (PAŻP)

Layoffs and pay reductions for Air Traffic Controllers jointly negotiated in response to pandemic



PAŻP attempted to make these changes permanent

Revenues declined



2020 joint agreement reached to cut costs by:

- Reducing staffing
- Reducing wages by 1/3



RECOVERY (2021)



2021 PAŻP seeks to make 2020 cuts permanent and issues new terms to ATCs



ATCs demand a return to pre-crisis wage and employment levels and refuse to accept new terms



2022 ATCs threaten collective abstention from work during peak summer travel period

- Unions launch PR campaign to frame their demands in terms of safety
- By shifting the narrative, Unions win public to their side



2022 agreement reached with ATCs

- Collective action averted
